• There are four potential event spaces in the new building: the meeting room on the main floor, and two meeting rooms upstairs. One of the upstairs rooms can be divided, resulting in four potential spaces.

• All of our collections (fiction, nonfiction, reference, biography, genealogy, large-print, children's, audiobooks, DVDs, and magazines) will remain in the main library building.

First sponsored in 1958, National Library Week is a national observance sponsored by the American Library Association (ALA) and libraries across the country each April.

National Library Week is an annual celebration highlighting the valuable role libraries, librarians and library workers play in transforming lives and communities. Libraries are at the heart of their cities, towns, schools and college campuses. They have public spaces where people of all backgrounds can come together and connect.

Libraries today are more about what they do, for and with library users as opposed to what they have for patrons. Libraries aren't only a place of quiet study, but also creative and engaging community centers where people can collaborate using new technologies, attend an educational program or just relax. 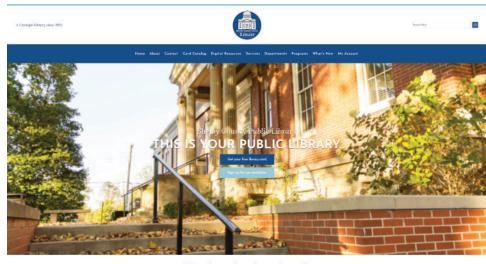

Face Off by Brenda Novak. Twenty-three of the world's

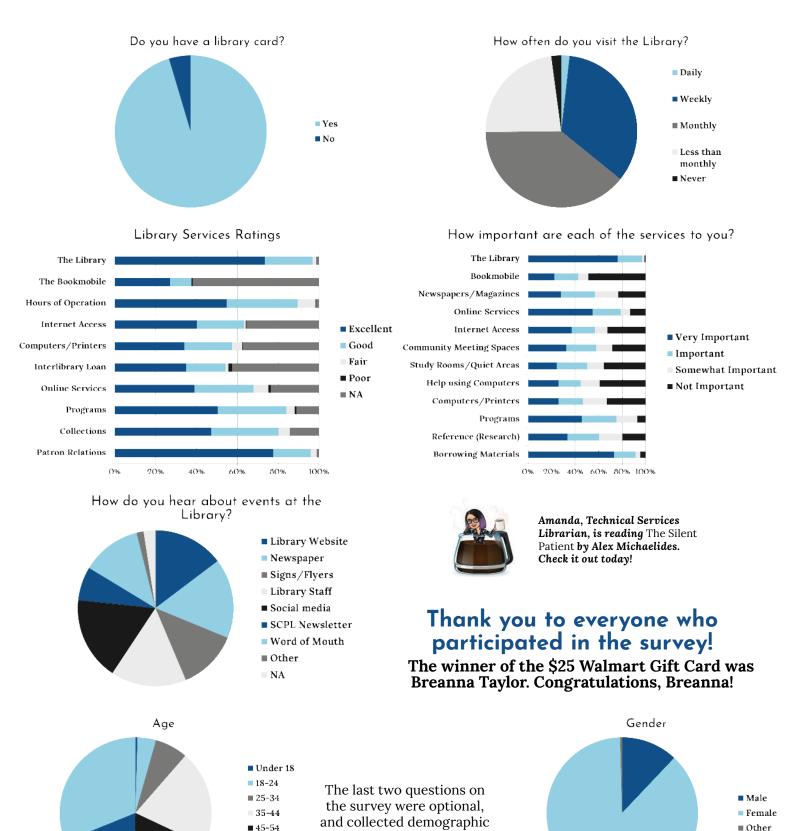
bestselling and critically acclaimed thriller writers pair their series characters in an eleven-story anthology curated by the International Thriller Writers.
